Southwest Waterfront Fireworks Festival Returns

he National Cherry Blossom Festival is the nation's greatest springtime celebration. The 2016 festival, March 20 – April 17, includes three spectacular weeks and four weekends of events featuring diverse and creative programming promoting traditional and contemporary arts and culture, natural beauty, and community spirit.

On Saturday, April 9, enjoy the Southwest Waterfront Fireworks Festival, presented by Harris Teeter, along Water St. SW between 600 Water St. SW to the Titanic Memorial Park from 1 to 9 p.m. Celebrate spring with the Southwest Waterfront community, home of the cherry blossoms, with eight hours of free entertainment. Enjoy live music at two performance stages, water-related activities, food trucks, a beer garden, lighted boats and lanterns, family activities, a Harris Teeter sample marketplace and green screen photo experience, and more. The event concludes with the spectacular Fireworks Show at 8:30 p.m. over the historic Washington Channel. The event is rain or shine.

The Southwest Waterfront is easily accessible by Metro's orange, blue, yellow, silver and green lines to Waterfront, Federal Center SW, and L'Enfant Plaza. The event is also an easy ride on Metrobus, and bicycle parking will be available on-site. Attendees are encouraged to view the fireworks display along the waterfront closest to the Titanic Memorial or at Hains Point.

The Mayor's Closing of DC General and Southwest's Future



n Feb. 11, 2016, I attended Mayor Bowser's community meeting for Southwest regarding her decision to close DC General and build short-term housing in each of the city's eight wards. The location for one of those shelters is proposed to be located behind the Blind Whino Arts Center near the old Randall school. Every seat in the multipurpose room at the Friendship Baptist Church was taken and the event became standing room only for those who came late. The meeting became contentious as residents openly expressed concerns about the strain on already limited local resources within SW, such as schools, transportation, and public safety-specifically on the potential for increased crime, assaults, robberies, burglaries, etc.

The mayor spoke briefly about the need for the temporary shelters, in that homeless persons deserve to live in a clean and safe place while in search for a permanent home. Residents were extremely frustrated that they were not included in the mayor's shelter location plan. Some accused the mayor of conducting back-door deals and not caring about this neighborhood. This sentiment led to someone inquiring about the DC Housing Authority (DCHA) and their role in this, to which the mayor responded by saying that the DCHA is working to help locate permanent housing for those who are currently homeless.

The mayor and her representatives explained that there will be social services available on-site to assist families in improving their lives. That led to people saying there are enough public housing spaces in the community that are not receiving such an outpouring of services and asked her what she is going to do about that. Her response was that the DCHA has jurisdiction for addressing that concern and that unfortunately, there was not a DCHA representative in the audience to speak further on the subject.

Only a few attendees expressed support for the mayor's plan, specifically representatives from the Interfaith Housing Coalition and maybe two others, but others expressed the feeling that, yes, we understand shortterm housing for the homeless is needed, but NIMBY (not in my backyard).

Community Rallies to Honor Black History

The community united to honor black history at the Amidon-Bowen Black History Month Celebration on Feb. 25, 2016.

Joined by American civil rights activist and freedom rider, Joan Trumpauer Mulholland, nearly 200 guests wrapped arms and sang We Shall Overcome. The choir, led by Para Perry, also performed the Black National Anthem Lift Every Voice and Sing, If You Miss Me at the Back of the Bus, and Keep Your Eyes on the Prize. Kindergarten students performed All Night All Day and Amidon-Bowen cheerleaders rallied the crowd.

Bowen Off Broadway, an Amidon-Bowen group of student actors, performed *A Doughnut and Coffee, With Cream on the Side,* a theatrical performance about the powerful peaceful protests at the Greensboro, North Carolina Woolworth's lunch counter in 1960, which marked the beginning in a series of influential moments that defined the struggle for racial equality in America.

Ward 1 Early Childhood Education Policy Council Representative Alexandra Simbana attended the event and celebrated in the occasion: "The school performance was a great collection of student talent. The kids did a great job acting, cheering, and singing what a great showcase of what is possible when schools and parents work together to showcase a school."

The parent committee, which organized the event in collaboration with Amidon-Bowen Elementary School, was thrilled at the community's generosity. The committee would like to thank its community sponsors, which included local restaurants Table (www.table.com); Bar Pilar (www.barpilar. com), which donated chef-made doughnuts; and Rise Up Coffee (www.riseupcoffee.com), who donated locally roasted, organic coffee. The event was concluded with a professional performance of *A Midsummer Night's Dream* by the Shakespeare Theatre Company (STC).

"We were honored to be part of the Black History Month Celebration. I love intro-

Most, but certainly not all, of the band members are senior citizens and most have recently come back to playing after many years dedicated to careers and family.


"Playing in a band is a great experience" said Richard Lang, who is relatively new to playing the trumpet and had never been in a band prior to joining New Horizons two years ago. "I'm always learning something new and improving my technique. As a career military officer, it's both a thrill and a privilege to go out to National Airport and play for World War II vets upon their arrival on Honor Flights. Our band also enjoys playing Christmas concerts at retirement homes.

"If someone told me that after a 50-year break I would be playing the clarinet in a band

again, I would have laughed out loud," said Anne Rensberger a Southwest resident and a semi-retired social worker. "At this stage of my life music is one area where I am actually getting better at something. Playing in a band was great when I was a school child but even more fun now. We have two bands, a concert and a swing band. I particularly like learning rock, swing, and Latin rhythms."

Although there are more than 200 New Horizons Bands active across the country, this one is unique in that it's also a course at the Levine School of Music's Virginia campus. Band members receive one hour of instruction in their instrument class, woodwinds for Anne and brass for Richard, followed by an hour of full band rehearsal. A final hour is usually devoted to learning jazz rhythms for those interested.

Riverside Baptist Redevelopment Gets the Nod from Zoning Commission

ast week, the Zoning Commission took final action to give approval to Riverside Baptist Church's consolidated PUD. A new sanctuary for Riverside will be built at 7th Street and Maine Avenue while PN Hoffman will build a 7-9-story rental apartment building with 170 units at 7th and I streets. About 10% of the units will be set aside as affordable housing for households earning up to 50%, 80% and 100% of Area Median Income. There will be space on the ground floor of the apartment building for community-serving uses, such as a daycare center.

The main issue that held up Zoning Commission approval was funds proffered to help attract a daycare facility. The developer offered \$25,000 to help attract a daycare provider, but the ANC wanted flexibility to use the funds for other potential users if a daycare center ultimately didn't occupy the Riverside site. The Zoning Commission was uncomfortable with this open-ended solution and asked that the developer come back before the Commission with a different recipient of the \$25,000 in the event a daycare center provider was not found. With PUD approval now in hand, the project is scheduled to start construction in the fourth quarter of this year. The Thelma D. Jones Breast Cancer Fund was created to help reduce the high number of breast cancer cases and high death rates among our region's most vulnerable residents.
