ore than 40 people, all family members and friends of six young students, gathered at the James Creek Resident Council on a recent cold Saturday afternoon. Welcomed by Youth Activities Task Force (YATF) Chairperson Thelma D. Jones and the center's coordinator Christine Spencer, the students were there to celebrate their graduation from the Southwest Neighborhood Assembly (SWNA) YATF's Computer-for-Kids computer training program.

YATF's signature program, now in its ninth year, has trained well over 100 children ages 5-13 from the community in its continuing effort to bridge the digital divide. Each student attended classes on Tuesday nights for eight weeks where they learned fundamental computer skills like keyboarding as well as a more demanding task such as putting together a self-styled Microsoft PowerPoint presentation complete with images from a wide range of websites.

This session's graduating class included Brayona and Kevion Scurry, Destiny Miller, Antonio Hamilton, Dereon West, and Zamya Davis. Davis was awarded cash prizes for per-

The volunteer-driven program, started by Jones in 2007, draws talented volunteers from the community and beyond. This year's graduation speaker, T. He also gave them great graduation gifts to show a tangible sign of their achievement. In addition, the graduates received refurbished computers to take home, provided by Perry Klein of SWNA's Technology Task Force, at the end of the graduation ceremony.

DC's First and Only Water Pier Office **Building Coming to The Wharf**

fficials from Hoffman-Madison Waterfront, developer of The Wharf, the \$2 billion, mile-long neighborhood located on DC's Southwest waterfront, today introduced DC's first office building to be built on a pier. With Pier 4's delivery in 2017, The Wharf continues to activate Washington, DC's waterfront in ways that had been previously unimagined. Extending 260 feet into the Potomac River, Pier 4 will offer tenants panoramic views of the Washington Channel and nearly the entire length of a bustling Wharf Street.

"There simply will be no other office building anywhere in the country that will offer the views, amenities, design features, and architectural distinction of The Wharf," said Amer Hammour, chairman of Madison Marquette. "In many ways, Pier 4 is a landmark of this transformative project, overlooking

the Potomac River in the middle of one of 12-foot ceiling heights, private covered outthe largest urban redevelopment programs in Washington's history."

"In a city as storied as our nation's capital, it is rare to encounter office space that can offer something truly new to the market. Being directly on the water and being immersed in the activity along The Wharf are an experience that simply can't be offered anywhere else in the city," said Monty Hoffman, founder and CEO of PN Hoffman. "In addition to the unparalleled location, tenants will find superior quality in Pier 4's light-filled space that has integrated cutting-edge connectivity and all of the hallmarks of contemporary trophy office space.'

The 28,000-square-foot Class A building boasts views of the Potomac River and looks over The Wharf and active waterways to the north. Building amenities include up to door terraces, a bike storage room with lockable racks, and a changing room with shower. The lobby's double-height entry has polished concrete flooring, exposed steel beam architectural component, and a grand natural wood feature wall. Typical column bays are 20 feet by 30 feet, providing users with spectacular view corridors and natural light. Additionally, the building is designed to LEED® Gold Core and Shell standards.

The first floor is fully leased, and availability remains on the upper two floors including 10,000 square feet on the second floor with a private 900-square-foot covered terrace, and 6,500 square feet on the third floor with a spectacular 3,000-square-foot private outdoor terrace.

Part of The Wharf-a multi-modal neighborhood only blocks from the U.S. Capitol-Pier 4 is incredibly accessible. The Wharf is only 10 minutes by car from Reagan Airport or Union Station and within walking distance to L'Enfant Plaza and Waterfront Metro stations. Free shuttle service to L'Enfant Plaza and the National Mall, four Capital Bikeshare stations and regional water taxi bring all of the city's highlights within easy reach.

DC Housing Authority Celebrates the Grand Opening of The Bixby

≺ he DC Housing Authority (DCHA), Urban Atlantic, Forest City Washington, and other city and community officials celebrated the arrival of The Bixby with a ribbon cutting on Dec. 13.

The \$54 million, 195-unit building in the Capitol Riverfront area includes 39 replacement units as part of the fifth phase of the Capper/Carrollsburg redevelopment.

"A clear goal of the Bowser administration is to provide more affordable and safe places to live for all District residents," said Brian Kenner, deputy mayor for planning & economic development. "We continue to deliver on that promise with the opening of The Bixby, a development that includes affordable housing and greater economic opportunity in our growing Navy Yard neighborhood."

The Bixby is one example of the innovative solutions DCHA and its partners have implemented in order to ensure DC remains an attractive place for residents of all income levels. Since 2001 the District has experienced steady population growth that underscores the increasing need for affordable housing in the Capitol Quarter/Navy Yard neighborhood and across the city.

"The DCHA Board is committed to helping the District remain as a viable option for working families that desire rental housing. We are pleased that having the 39 affordable public housing units in this great building also keeps the agency on track to achieve the one-for-one replacement of public housing units in this redeveloped community," said DCHA Board of Commissioners Chairman Terri Thompson.

"I am proud to welcome home former Capper/Carrollsburg residents and new community members to this fantastic neighborhood," said DCHA Executive Director Adrianne Todman. "As promised, DCHA has continued to rebuild the public housing that was torn down years ago. With The Bixby, this growing community now has 438 new homes for low-income families."

The entire neighborhood was acknowledged by Urban Land Institute with its Impact Award in 2015 for being a development that represents great promise and forward thinking with respect to the responsible land use.

"The opening of The Bixby is an important step toward fulfilling the promise of the redevelopment of the former Capper and Carrollsburg public housing communities. This beautiful mixed-income building adds to the vibrancy of Ward 6 and shows what we can do together working for the District's residents," said Ward 6 Councilmember Charles Allen.

"Urban Atlantic is proud to continue its partnership with the District of Columbia Housing Authority and Forest City to redevelop the Capper/Carrollsburg community as we open The Bixby, a beautiful new Class A apartment building that affordable and market rate renters alike will call home," said Vicki Davis, president of Urban Atlantic Development. "This building offers residents brand new apartment units and amenities, as well as incredible proximity to employment, retail, recreation, and public transportation."

Deborah Ratner Salzberg, president of Forest City Washington, said "Forest City worked in close partnership with the DC Housing Authority and Urban Atlantic to make this project happen and we are very excited to officially open The Bixby."

The Bixby, located at 601 L St. SE, features studio to four-bedroom units and luxury apartment amenities, including a rooftop pool, that are available to all residents.





Winter Weather: Preparing for Extreme Cold and Winter Storms

What to Do During a Winter Storm:

- Stay indoors as much as possible.
- Maintain ventilation when using kerosene heaters to avoid build-up of toxic fumes. Refuel kerosene heaters outside and keep them at least three feet from flammable objects.
- Keep your gas tank as full as possible during cold weather.
- Stay on main roads; avoid back roads and

alleys.

- Avoid overexertion when shoveling snow. Overexertion can bring on a heart attack a major cause of death during the winter.
 Listen to the radio or television for infor-
- mation.
- Dress for the weather. Wear several layers of loose fitting, lightweight, warm clothing rather than one layer of heavy clothing. Wear mittens, a hat and cover your mouth with a scarf to protect your lungs.

- Use safe heating sources—be aware of the fire danger from space heaters and candles; keep such devices away from all flammable materials.
- Turn space heaters off at night and when you are not at home.
- Install recommended smoke and carbon monoxide detectors (at least one of each per floor in your home).
- Do not use charcoal or other fuel-burning devices, such as grills, that produce carbon monoxide indoors.
- When outdoors, try to stay in dry and wind-protected areas.
- Drink plenty of non-alcoholic fluids and eat high calorie foods.
- Keep an Emergency Kit in your home and car.
- Clear snow and ice from sidewalks and steps next to your home and/or business. DC law requires residents to remove snow from sidewalks and steps within eight hours of daylight after the snow stops.
- DO NOT park your car on a Snow Emergency Route if a snow emergency is declared. Vehicles parked on these streets are subject to a \$250 fine and/or towing. You can find information on the District Department of Transportation's Snow Emergency Vehicle Towing Policy at http://ddot.dc.gov/ page/snow-emergency-vehicle-towing-policy.
- When driving, take it slow. If you do lose traction, do not fight the skid—ease up on the brakes and steer toward where you want to go.

- *Blizzard Warning:* Sustained winds or frequent gusts to 35 miles per hour or greater and considerable amounts of falling or blowing snow (reducing visibility to less than a quarter of a mile) are expected for a period of three hours or longer.
- *Frost/Freeze Warning:* Below freezing temperatures are expected.
- *Freezing Rain*: Rain that freezes when it hits the ground, creating a coating of ice on roads, walkways, trees, and power lines.
- *Sleet:* Rain that turns to ice pellets before reaching the ground, causing moisture on roads to freeze and become slippery.

Do You Have an Emergency Supply Kit?

An emergency supply kit is a collection of basic items your household may need in the event of an emergency. Visit the Homeland Security and Emergency Management Agency's website at http://hsema.dc.gov/page/ make-emergency-go-kit for guidance on how to make a kit and a full list of suggested items.

Try to assemble your kit well in advance of an emergency. Remember, you may have to evacuate at a moment's notice and take essentials with you. Once a disaster hits you will not have time to shop or search for supplies.

Watch Out for Frostbite and Hypothermia

- Signs of frostbite: Skin appears white and waxy, numbress or no feeling in that area and/or possible blisters.
- *Signs of hypothermia*—Shivering and numbness, confusion or dizziness, stumbling and weakness, slow or slurred speech, and shock.

Watch for homeless people stranded in the cold, and call the Shelter Hotline at 1 (800) 535-7252 or (202) 399-7093.

If you or someone you know is experiencing signs of frostbite or hypothermia, you should immediately go to a medical facility or call 911.


