Navy Yard and Buzzard Point Proposed for Amazon Headquarters

hen Amazon made a request for proposals (RFP) for their new second headquarters (HQ2), cities across the United States jumped at the opportunity. With the lure of bringing 50,000 highpaying jobs to the District, Mayor Muriel Bowser and Deputy Mayor for Economic Development Brian Kenner leapt at the chance-actually four times over. Like Amazon, the city opted for options. DC's proposal, which is likely to be very different than any other, offers four different sites across the District as possible locations for the tech giant's east coast hub: Anacostia Riverfront, NoMa-Union Station, Capitol Hill East, Shaw-Howard University. The deadline to submit the proposal to Amazon was Oct. 19.

Amazon's RFP has one sticking point that required the city to think creatively: Eight million square feet of available real estate for HQ2. There is no single available property in the District that could accommodate eight million square feet without significant zoning changes. Two options appear to be the leaders: Anacostia Riverfront and Capitol Hill East (RFK Stadium

area). Amazon said it plans to invest up to \$5 billion in construction over the next 10-15 years to create its second headquar-

The Anacostia Riverfront proposal spans both sides of South Capitol St. as well as the Anacostia River, comprised of the Buzzard Point, Navy Yard, and Anacostia Metro areas. Because Amazon needs at least 500,000 square feet to start, each location needs to have an available office building or one on the way to completion.

Navy Yard and Buzzard Point can offer that, as both locations will have available space come 2018-2019. Dubbing the area the Anacostia Riverfront, the city's proposal sells it as a "riverfront sports and entertainment hub accessible by land and water." It goes on to say:

"The Anacostia Riverfront proposal provides riverfront space along one of Washington, DC's main waterways. It offers the

Taking to the Water to Get to The Wharf

he weekend of Oct. 14, I, like many others in the DC area, wanted to experience The Wharf's opening for myself. However, bored of my usual metro ride into DC from Alexandria and weary of parking logistics at The Wharf, I wanted to try a new route to the city, so I took to the water.

The Potomac Riverboat Company (PRC) launched a water taxi service coasting from Alexandria or Georgetown directly to The Wharf. I arrived behind the Torpedo Factory Art Center with five minutes to spare before the taxi's 2:25 p.m. departure. Taste the Nation at District Winery

hen District Winery Co-Founders Brian Leventhal and John Stires first thought about making wine, they were a consultant and a product manager, respectively. Winemaking to them started as a weekend hobby with friends to get away from the hustle and bustle of New York City and escape to New Jersey farm country. That was in 2007. By Feb. 2010 they knew they were onto something, so they quit their jobs and went all in. In the eight-month whirlwind that followed, Leventhal and Stires had hired Conor McCormack to be their winemaker, found an industrial warehouse in Brooklyn, and were in and operating. After a few years of tweaks and changes, the group was hosting 100 weddings a year and offering turnkey private events in their space. The wine business took off as well.

McCormack got his start in northern California making wines from grapes sourced from Napa, Sonoma, and Mendocino counties. If you saw his workspace you would think he's a chemist, as his lab

is full of beakers and science equipment, instead of a winemaker who is always testing the boundaries. McCormack has an aptitude for creation. Whereas he once

used grapes from three counties in one region of one state, the winemaker now sources grapes from all over the country. His goal, however, remains the same: Make the best, purest, most unadulterated wine possible. "I strive to make elegant yet intense wines that showcase a particular site from a particular year. I want to highlight each region for what it can

do best, while also pushing the boundaries of what is often expected," McCormack says.

When you see the winery's latest venture in Navy Yard, you would think the space is nothing more than a pretty building offering nice wines to match the amazing view over the Anacostia River. That could not be further from the truth. The team sources the grapes from across the United States, but every wine sold at District Winery is produced in-house by the team. When the grapes arrive at Navy Yard, they are still on the vine. When they leave, they are in your glass. Everything is done in-house.

If you can't wait until you get home to sample the goods, District Winery offers wine tasting in its expansive, open lobby or at the on-site restaurant, Ana. Ana is named after the Anacostia River, which the restaurant overlooks. With dishes like crab beig-


The Salt Line Is Making Big Waves

e sat down with partner Jeremy Carman of Long Shot Hospitality—the team behind The Salt Line-to dig into why they chose Navy Yard, what makes them tick, what it's like to have a Washington Nationals player as an investor, and their fast rise to the top echelons of DC dining.

First, what makes the location of The Salt Line so special? What is your first impression of the Navy Yard neighborhood?

We've all been in DC for a long time, and even five to 10 years ago, the idea of opening a waterfront restaurant on the Anacostia [River] would have met serious skepticism. Even when we first started kicking the tires on the project in late 2014, we weren't sure if the neighborhood could sustain beyond gameday business. It's been an

incredible experience to be a part of the growth of the neighborhood and to see the waterfront emerge as a great amenity for both the neighborhood and residents from all over the city. The neighborhood is so much more than just Nationals Park,



immediately realizes why so many people are flocking to this neighborhood.

The Long Shot Hospitality team has varied backgrounds. How did you come together? Why does it seem to work so well?

The team has come together over the course of 12 years, with Paul Holder and myself first partnering in 2005, and as we've grown we've also evolved as restaurateurs. As we grow and encounter different life experiences, it shapes the type of

restaurants we want to own and operate. The places we wanted to own when we were in our late 20s are different than what we want to operate now (or were capable of doing 10 years ago). Our different experiences really complement each other, and while we all have opinions, we respect each other's lanes and the insights we can each bring on different areas of operations.

What has it been like to partner with Heather and Ryan Zimmerman on the project?

The Zimmermans have been great friends and investors. We have known

each other for quite a while at this point and it's been fun to have them involved. They both love the restaurant community in the DC area, and are really into food and beverage. They have both been great advocates for the restaurant, and we think that we've put forth a restaurant they (and all the other investors) can be proud of.

How often do Nationals players and their families make it over to the restaurant?

We see the families regularly throughout the season, and occasionand anyone who spends time down here ally the players, depending on off-days and pitching schedules. We hosted the team for a private celebration the night they clinched the NL [National League]

What are you looking forward to most after opening in Navy Yard?

We're looking forward to catching our breath in the off-season and really just being a neighborhood restaurant for all our great neighbors. There's a lot more we

An Interview with Felicia Curry of Nina Simone: Four Women

elicia Curry is a rising star in the DC Theater scene. She has appeared at all the major theater venues in our area and garnered five Helen Hayes nominations.

Felicia will next be seen at the Arena Stage production of Nina Simone: Four Women, opening Nov. 11 and playing through Dec. 24. The show is built around a song that Nina Simone wrote in which four black women talk about their bitter experiences with racism.

How is your character Sweet Thing, who is a prostitute, both alike and yet different from the others—Sarah (played by Theresa Cunningham) who was a slave, and Sephronia (Toni Martin) who is light skinned—as well as Nina Simone herself (Harriett D. Foy).

Sweet Thing is loud and crass, carries a knife, clearly doesn't mind showing off her body, and always tells it like it is.

The beauty of what we are learning as we delve deeper into the material is that what seemingly separates these womenappearance, circumstance, opportunityall comes from the similar burden they all carry: being a black woman in America in the 1960s and how the world perceives and responds to us.

It is the very thing that has brought them to this place, on this day. All curious how to "fight," how to move forward after a tragedy that has taken the lives of four little girls who had their opportunity to become four women taken from them simply because of their appearance.

How much had you known about Nina Simone before and how has being in this production enhanced what you know of her?

I was familiar with her music, even had the opportunity to perform some of it, but admittedly, this production has opened my eyes to all of who Nina is and was, the scope of her music and the battles she fought using her greatest weapon: music.

What has been the most exciting part of rehearsals?

Bonding with these four women. Learning that our experiences, our stories, our journeys are incredibly

similar ... having the freedom to have this versation and allowing her words to have frank, direct, open conversation about things we as black women have been conditioned to keep to ourselves.

And the icing on the cake: weaving Nina's music and voice through the connew life in 2017!

When did you know you wanted to be an actress? What advice would you pass on to children who want to be in show business?

I've been performing since I was five years old. I think I've always known, it is in my blood, it's who I am!

Here is my advice:

One: Don't be afraid to look silly. That's part of the process, a fun part if you truly allow yourself to go there.

Two: This business is about collaboration. All of the pieces are necessary to create the art. Be kind, respectful, generous to your fellow collaborators, and make sure you're doing your part to give all you can to the group and the project.

Three: Probably the last thing young people want to hear: Continue to do your homework. ... Research, ask questions, watch movies, ask more questions. All of this will help you develop as an artist and enrich each character, each line, each lyric you have the privilege of embodying.





can do creatively during the winter season without all the crowds that swell on game days, and I think our neighbors will be excited to see some of our upcoming fall/winter menu offerings.

Which purveyors do you regularly work with?

Well, we have great relationships with a lot of local purveyors, but one that stands out is our partnership with Old Line Fish Co. Once or twice a week, the team at Old Line brings us the catch of local watermen without us really knowing what's coming. Rather than asking them to go out and bring us something specific, they bring us their day's catch and we work it into our program: rockfish, eels, soft shells, perch, monkfish, soft shell clams, etc. This is a model that Chef Kyle Bailey really loves as it's supply driven instead of demand. It also keeps the kitchen team on their toes!

Can you speak more about the restaurant's commitment to sustainability and any partnerships you may have?

We have partnered with Dock-to-Dish to be the founding restaurant in the DC area. The program first launched in New York, and has now also spread to LA and Vancouver, and includes other partners like Dan Barber and Michael Cimarusti. The program embodies a CSA [community supported agriculture] type model championed by farms in which we try to encourage local fisherman to source us their day's catch. It cuts out touches and middlemen, offers a fisherman a better wage, and helps us truly know where our fish is coming from.

How was it receiving three out of four stars from Tom Sietsema of *The Washington Post*?

It was an incredible honor. There was a lot of planning and time that went into this restaurant from inception, and we spent over two years trying to bring it to life. To see it all come to fruition, and to then be received enthusiastically by our guests, and to be recognized with three stars by Mr. Sietsema, is certainly the high point of our careers thus far. Beyond all that, though, my favorite part of the review process was seeing how happy the entire team was when they saw it. Everyone here worked so hard those first several months, and to be rewarded with a positive review really tied all that hard work together.

Finally, for someone visiting for the first time, what is the dish they cannot miss?

The Johnny Cake is the sleeper dish on the menu. It's a cornmeal pancake that is cooked in cast iron, which makes it crispy on the outside and soft in the middle. It's topped with smoked whitefish salad, honey butter, and marinated salmon roe. The perfect combination of crispy, salty, savory, and sweet.



Kadampa, A Temple for World Peace

If you've walked past the Department of Motor Vehicles recently you may have noticed a new tenant in the old La Esperanza Viva church at the corner of M and Canal Streets SW. This summer, a temporary sign went up announcing the Kadampa meditation, a form of religion my knowledge of which only went as far as its name. Kadampa is a Buddhist temple that is completely open to the public.

On Thursday evenings, the Kadampa Meditation Center hosts a weekly meditation class. As I entered the space, I was directed downstairs for the class as the main floor is being renovated. (The projected opening is late winter 2017/early spring 2018.) I entered the class and was greeted by Gen Demo, a short, unassuming woman with more than 18 years of teaching experience under her belt. ("Gen" is a respectful title given to a Buddhist teacher after four years of teaching.) I had heard about the beneficial effects of meditation, but had never tried it, especially in a formal setting.

The class began with a short breathing meditation led by our teacher. Next, Gen spoke on tonight's topic: "self-esteem versus self-importance." Each month, Kadampa chooses a theme

to discuss at these weekly meditation classes and each week they build on that theme. The class finished with more meditation time to reflect on the lesson for the evening. At first, I was definitely a little fidgety during the meditation portion, but I have heard that this subsides the more you practice. After this hour-and-a-half-long class, I went home feeling relaxed and refreshed for the evening.

Later, I spoke with Gen Demo to learn more about the center and how it came to find its permanent home in Southwest. Kadampa now owns the new space at 1200 Canal St. SW with help from the International Temples Project Fund. The goal was to purchase a new space after their previous rental space in Adams Morgan was bought and torn down. Gen believes many of the neighbors are happy to see this space continue to be used for spiritual purposes as opposed to being sold to a developer.



Emergency Preparedness Task Force Holds Book Talk at St. Augustine's

o observe the International Day for Disaster Reduction on Oct.13, the Southwest Neighborhood Assembly's Emergency Preparedness Task Force (SWEPT) held a book talk at St. Augustine's Episcopal Church. The authors and environmentalists, Dr. John "Jack" Wennersten and Denise Robbins, discussed their new book, Rising Tides: Climate Refugees in the Twenty-First Century.

Whereas asylum seekers fleeing persecution are frequently in the public spotlight these days, climate refugees are rarely mentioned, despite the fact that out of more than 50,000,000 refugees around the world, 20,000,000 are climate refugees, the writers report. According to Wennersten and Robbins, the number of climate refugees will continue to rise as a result of the growing impacts of climate change and the eventuality of "climate departure," an idea that the climate is moving away from a rational pattern toward unpredictability. Governments and societies will not be able to dismiss the problem forever and should focus on sustainable absorption and resettlement


processes to address climate refugees.

The devastation of this year's hurricane season in the United States highlights the relevance of the issue for us here at home. At the end of the talk, the audience reflected on whether DC is prepared for a major natural disaster and would be able to accommodate climate refugees from somewhere else in the country.



best of two worlds: a breathtaking river corridor with more than 1,200 acres of parklands integrated into a high-density and transit-oriented community that is accessible by walking, biking, metro, ferry, or even kayak. The location includes Capitol Riverfront, which is five blocks from the United States Capitol, and encompasses the Yards Park and Buzzard Point neighborhoods. Capitol Riverfront is DC's fastest growing neighborhood with 8,000 residents and a commuting workforce of more than 34,000. Home to Nationals Park and Audi Field, the area is a vibrant entertainment hub. A quick stroll across the soon-to-be-constructed, world-class bridge leads directly into Poplar Point, where consolidated building opportunities await along Anacostia Park. Anacostia Riverfront provides a space where urban living meets water, people meet parks, and history meets progress."

The city has been aggressive in its push since Sept. 14, when Mayor Bowser released a video asking Amazon's Alexa device where the new Amazon HO2 will be located. The device responded, "Obviously, Washington, DC." Since then the city has highlighted its accolades, including: No. 1 City for Women in Tech (Forbes 2017), No. 1 Restaurant City (Bon Appetit 2016), No. 1 Coolest City (Forbes 2014), No. 1 Best City for Tech (SmartAsset 2016), No. 1 City for Women's Employment and Earnings (2016); First LEED Platinum City in the World (U.S. Green Building Council). Deputy Mayor Kenner has not said what the District might offer to incentivize Amazon, saying those details would be worked out after Amazon expressed interest in the District's proposal. Mayor Bowser's administration, however, has been aggressive in offering taxpayer dollars to corporations in order to bring jobs to the city.

nets, pig shoulder confit, and the corn and grayson cappelletti, you are sure to find something to pair with each and every wine—all 14 of them currently available. And the results are impressive. Some favorites include a 2014 "skin-contact" Riesling, produced from grapes sourced from the Finger Lakes region of New York state, which McCormack made at their Brooklyn Winery and is a high seller in Navy Yard. It's not sweet, making you take a second taste to make sure you did not miss anything. The 2015 unoaked Chardonnay is actually crisp and not buttery at all. The 2014 pinot noir, sourced from the Columbia River Gorge in Washington state, comes off dry and earthy. The 2014 Long Island-sourced Cabernet Franc is dry with a hint of spiciness. The top of the class, however, might be the 2015 Old Vine Zinfandel from Lodi, California, with grapes off 1916 and 1965 vines.

With nine white wine and six red wine fermenters, McCormack and his winemaking team are always pushing to see what they can do next. The District Winery crew is sure to keep the hits coming, bringing in grapes from Virginia, like the petit manseng, which is sure to be a hit. The skin-contact, white grapes will produce an orange wine that the waterfront will be talking about in the seasons to come. The same holds true for diners at Ana, where the menu will change over time. With the 2017 harvest season at District Winery just wrapping up, be ready to see those fine grapes in liquid form as early as 2018 and for many years after at Navy Yard's newest gem.
