

IT'S HERE: THE WHARF OPENS

fter more than a decade of starts and stops, The Wharf finally arrives. On Oct. 12, the Southwest waterfront will begin a new era bringing the nation's waterfront on par with other great waterfront cities.

As professor Robert Lewis says, "Washington has comparatively little residential, commercial, or cultural structures occupying its shorelines. A few developments, such as the Watergate complex and Kennedy Center, have river views and proximity but without river connectivity." The Wharf has both proximity and river connectivity. The 60-foot-wide Wharf Street promenade will separate the Washington Channel from the capital's most anticipated venture in decades.

TRANSIT

The Wharf will be served from the water's edge for patrons coming or going. Public docking will allow guests arriving by water to tie up and visit the many shops along the promenade. For those looking to escape by water, they will be able The 60-foot-wide Wharf Street promenade will separate the Washington Channel from the capital's most anticipated venture in decades.

to take the **Water Taxi** from Transit Pier to Nationals Park, National Harbor, Old Town Alexandria, or Georgetown. There is also a free **Wharf Jitney** from the Recreation Pier to ride across to East Potomac Park.

District Pier, The Wharf's largest pier is a dramatic gathering place and backdrop to festivals. Market Pier is for direct waterside access for boaters and visitors to the Market Square and the Municipal Fish Market. Besides the Water Taxi, Transit Pier is a bustling launch pad that will also have a number of things to do, from live concerts to ice skating in the winter. Patrons will be able to rent kayaks and paddleboards from the public-access **Recreation Pier** (or bring your own), and take them directly onto the water.

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On the Maine Avenue side of the milelong venture, Capital Bikeshare will add two new docks open at 9th St. SW and near the **Fish Market**, joining the current dock near Arena Stage/Gangplank Marina

The Southwest Shuttle will offer free rides to L'Enfant Plaza Metro/VRE station (7th St. and Maryland Ave. SW), the National Mall (7th St. at Independence Ave. SW), and L'Enfant Plaza/International Spy Museum (10th St. SW).

GREEN SPACE

The Wharf is home to 10 acres of parks and open green spaces as well as four distinct piers for recreation and transpor-

Westminster to Screen *The Good Breast* in Honor of Breast Cancer Awareness Month

n observation of Breast Cancer Month, Westminster Presbyterian Church's Faith & Film Ministries is partnering with the Thelma D. Jones Breast Cancer Fund in presenting the documentary *The Good Breast*, an official selection of the 2016 Bentonville Film Festival.

The documentary shares the diverse emotional journeys of four women and their surgeon as they face the challenges of breast cancer. Their experiences reveal

> how the breast is far more than just an organ, but contains within it all the history, suffering, and power of female identity. In the documentary, veteran surgeon Dr. Lauren Schnaper advocates for breast conservation and debunks breast cancer myths. She believes that fear, ignorance, and pink-ribbon culture are fueling an explosive rate of unnecessary mastectomies in the United States. The story blends medical archival footage with extensive "collateral damage" suffered by the strikingly different women who undergo postmastectomy breast reconstruction. These women allow us to have intimate access to their search for the "good breast."

Introducing the film and facilitating questions and discussion following will be the film's director, professor Bernadette Wegenstein. She is an Austrian-born linguist, author, and professor at Johns Hopkins University, where she is also the founder and director of the Center for Advanced Media Studies. Her past documentaries include *Made Over in Amer*ica and *See You Soon Again.* "I decided to situate the film exactly in that vulnerable gray zone between medical practice and lived experience," she said, "looking for a dialogue between the two."

The documentary will be shown at Westminster Presbyterian Church located at 400 I St. SW on Saturday, Oct. 14.

Seating starts at 6:30 p.m. and the introduction and showing of the film begins at 7 p.m.

Kirwan's, a True Irish Pub

hen owner Mark Kirwan describes his Irish pub coming to The Wharf, he says, "I put my name on it so you know I believe in it. This is a real Irish feeling, not a Disneyland Ireland experience." And that holds true, down to the pictures on the walls of Kirwan and his family.

Kirwan's Irish Pub is anything but a bar-in-a-box. The interior décor was handmade in Ireland, shipped over in four shipping containers via the Baltimore harbor, and installed by Irish carpenters. The blend of salvaged and new wood mixed with the Irish floor tiles and light fixtures gives this pub a truly Irish feel.

A slight nautical theme throughout the bar pays homage to Southwest. That nod comes thanks to all the time Kirwan spent at the Library of Congress researching the Irish and Scottish coming to the Southwest waterfront when it was a trading port and home to many of the city's poorest, long before the Urban Renewal of the 1960s.

It has been a long time coming, says Navy Yard resident Kirwan, who was the first tenant to sign a letter of intent with The Wharf six years ago. The Irish gastropub was awarded an excellent location at 749 Wharf St. SW at the corner of Pearl St. The pub will include two patios along

the water on either side of Wharf St. The three bars inside the restaurant will serve traditional Irish food with a twist. The combination of prime steaks and inhouse ground burgers mixed with fish and chips will offer patrons the option

> of either a quality sit-down meal or a quick bite to eat. The menu will "strongly emphasize local foods," Kirwan says.

The downstairs bar will compete with the upstairs bar with open views of the Channel, and will even feature three fireplaces. Be sure not to overlook the whis-

key bar in the back of the restaurant, which will offer many Irish favorites that are not easy to come by in the District.

Kirwan's is poised to be the prime waterfront meeting location for Southwest neighbors. "We want to be the neighborhood bar. We want Bob who lives on Gangplank Marina; we don't want the suits." While the pub works out the final steps, Kirwan expects to have live music more than half the week as well as happy hour specials. One thing for sure is that the pub will aim to be "*the* rugby bar in the District," says the former high school rugby coach. Rugby or not, visitors to Kirwan's are sure to get a true Irish experience.



Foo Fighters? Sure. But The Anthem Is Much More

The Wharf come Oct. 12 might not be any of the dozens of restaurants and shops, but instead the building underneath The Channel apartments. It is a building that "has the illusion of a stadium, but the intimacy of a nightclub," according to Foo Fighters frontman Dave Grohl. The idea that the three-story concert hall that has capacity for 2,500 to 6,000 people seems unheard of, because it is.

The I.M.P. team of Seth Hurwitz and Rich Heinecke—yes, the same guys behind 9:30 Club, Lincoln Theatre, and Merriweather Post Pavilion—have created something the United States has not seen. That's because Hurwitz has been "looking for a mid-size music location for over 10 years" and finally found it. The Anthem is a music hall the fans and the performers will both love no matter their location.

The "Super Excellent Seats" on the second and third balconies are canted perfectly to align with the stage. That means that no two seats are the same thanks to computer-aided design and the same sound team as 9:30 Club and Merriweather. That small detail on the seats is surprisingly thanks to Monty Hoffman,

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
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Freer/Sackler Gallery Reopens: an Interview with Curator Carol Huh

s the Freer Gallery of Art and the Arthur M. Sackler Gallery prepare for their joint reopening, we talked with one of our neighbors, Carol Huh. Carol was the first curator of contemporary art at the galleries, which are devoted to Asian art. In the last 10 years, she has been involved with many exhibitions at the Sackler and now is part of a team that is readying for the reopening, which will take place on Oct. 14-15.

What can visitors now expect from the Freer Gallery of Art and Arthur M. Sackler Gallery?

The Freer has been closed for renovation since January 2016 in order to return the museum's interior to its original 1923 design and also upgrade the climate control and security systems and install new technologies that enhance the visitor experience. The closure has given our curatorial team the unique opportunity to reinterpret our collections and re-imagine the galleries so we can continue to engage the public through relevant, thematically arranged displays.

Charles Freer believed that beauty transcended any specific time or place, so even though the collection ranges from American art in the late 19th and early 20th centuries to art from ancient China, the objects on display all reflect his belief in the transcendent, universal language of beauty.

Similarly, the Sackler features four exhibitions that span across Asia and across centuries, so we're really excited to have such a wide-ranging display of beautiful, timeless objects and stories in both galler-

What is it like to be a curator at the Sackler? What have been some of the challenges for you as curator in the renovation process?

As with any renovation, available work space shrinks. During the Freer closure, staff had to be moved into the Sackler and spaces for public programs were reduced. All of this made us cozy office mates in the Sackler! Nevertheless, everyone has worked very hard and been very supportive of each other.

As a curator, I am surrounded by experts in their fields and nourished daily in an environment that fosters intellectual

growth. One of the joys is also spending time with extraordinary objects, and the rich history of peoples, ideas, and places they embody. One of the challenges has been access to our collections.

As a preeminent research institution with a world-renowned collection, we also often get requests from scholars, artists, and other members of the public to view objects. Access has been extremely limited since the Freer has been closed and staff busy preparing over a dozen exhibitions for the grand reopening.

What are some of the things for visitors to look out for that you think are most special in the Sackler Gallery reopening ?

We are opening four exhibitions at once—with objects from Egypt, China, Korea, Southeast Asia, Tibet, and India, among others, and dating from 2008 B.C.E. to 2010 C.E. There will be much to see and think about! The exhibitions will have immersive elements—an entire Tibetan shrine, a video installation of a day in the life of a Sri Lankan stupa, and a walk through a gleaming landscape by a contemporary Indian artist.

founder and CEO of PN Hoffman, half of the Hoffman-Madison development team behind the \$2.5 billion Wharf project.

What would seemingly be a less-thanperfect pairing, Hoffman and Hurwitz are anything but. The yin to Hurwitz's yang, the polished Hoffman is credited with rejecting the DC government's recommendation of an art gallery and instead wanted a music hall. The gruff, straightforward Hurwitz was the ideal match for one simple reason: Both men have mastered the customer experience. It also helps that both men are self-made.

Whereas other music promoters have been bought out, Hurwitz has thrived while staying local. The I.M.P. team is the most iconic music promoter in metro DC area. In 2013, *Rolling Stone* magazine named 9:30 Club, which opened in 1980, the best music venue in the United States. That's not by mistake, but instead by instincts, diligence, and detail in order to deliver the best customer experience.

From the second you walk in you are met with an over-the-top experience. The large space has an industrial feel blending dark wood, black metal, and gray

What are some of the public events planned at the opening weekend?

We will have a wide array of events. Special highlights are:

From 6 p.m. to midnight on Oct. 14: "Disruption: Video Art from Asia," a screening of provocative works by Shahzia Sikander, Ahmad Ghossein, Sun Xun, Moon Kyungwon, and Tuan Andrew Nguyen in the Freer's Meyer auditorium.

Also planned is a return of the groundbreaking "Culturunners RV," which has been touring the U.S. with artists from Saudi Arabia. There will also be a major projection mapping event on the façade of the Freer (Mall side).

On Oct. 15 at 3 p.m. I will be in conversation with internationally acclaimed artist Subodh Gupta, whose installation "Terminal" will be on view in the next installment of the Sackler contemporary series. South and Southeast Asian Art Curator Debra Diamond will also be in conversation with filmmaker Stanley Staniski, who produced a film in the "Encountering a Buddha" exhibition that explores the cycles and practices of contemporary Sri Lankan Buddhists. Finally, Tommy Wide will be in conversation with members of the Silk Road Ensemble.

On both Saturday and Sunday, in addition to all the Sackler has to offer, visitors will be able to visit the incredible, thought-provoking thematic galleries in the Freer, and curators will host casual gallery talks that will take place throughout the weekend.

concrete—a theme throughout the venue. Looking up in the entrance hall you see four glass square windows that are actually the floor of the infinity pool of The Channel above. (Don't worry, bathing suits are required.) Speaking of the neighbors upstairs, the concert hall is built with advanced soundproofing and air gaps to mitigate against sound vibrations.

As you enter, you naturally flow to the left toward the stage. Although a 6,000-person venue might sound big, The Anthem impressively feels intimate. For neighborhood comparison, it feels most like Arena Stage's Fichandler Stage and a theater in the round format. Even from the back of the house, you still feel like part of the show. The sight lines cannot be beat from the main floor up to the third-level balcony's General Admission standing areas. Seven large bars are spread throughout (bathrooms, too) to hopefully keep lines short. Large, open staircases and generous standing room should ensure space from your fellow concertgoer.

The rest of the numbers at The Wharf might sound astounding (three million square feet over 24 acres along a one-mile stretch), but The Anthem's sell-out capacity of 6,000 will not.

tation. Seventh Street Park is a lush and energetic green space for relaxation and outdoor workouts featuring walking trails, benches, and stand-up desks. Waterfront Park, a 3.5-acre park right at the edge of the Wharf with rows of willow trees, shady

trellises, and room for bocce is dedicated to DC Congresswoman Eleanor Holmes Norton. Banneker Park, beginning a \$4 million renovation, sits just north of Market Square and connects The Wharf to the L'Enfant Plaza promenade.

RESTAURANTS & BARS

First things first, our two favorite Southwest Waterfront staples, Jenny's at The Wharf (on the Southwest waterfront since 1981) and Cantina Marina, will remain for the time being (until closing and reopening with Phase 2 of The Wharf in 2021). Fret not, Cantina Bambina will be open along Transit Pier in case you need a quick bite to eat before you shuffle off to The Anthem for a concert or hop on a water taxi.

New restaurants to the neighborhood will span the world and the seas. Kaliwa will add a second Asian restaurant, while Florentijn will be the first Belgian restaurant. Competing for best mussels along the water will be La Vie, a coastal cuisine restaurant. Joining them will be Hank's Oyster Bar and Rappahannock Oyster Company for all the bivalves you can handle.

From the same team behind Southwest's Station 4 comes Italian restaurant Lupo Marino. And Stefanelli's Italian Market is a three-story spot offering various spaces and dining and shopping options, opening this spring.

Master chef Fabio Trabocchi opens his Spanish-themed restaurant Del Mar. And in keeping with the Mediterranean theme, French restaurant Requin is a partnership between Top Chef's Jennifer Carroll and restaurateur Mike Isabella.

Speaking of top chefs, Kwame Onwuachi will open Kith/Kin at the InterContinental Hotel, a refined, family-style, Afro-Caribbean inspired affair. And finally, a long-awaited Mexican restaurant will open along the waterfront, with acclaimed chef Roberto Santibañez opening Mi Vida, which is sure to be the life of many Southwesters.

But you don't only have to eat sitting down. Fast-casual American restaurants will join the mix with Taylor Gourmet and Shake Shack both opening shops along Maine Ave. SW.

And it won't just be about the food. The Wharf will bring a number of bars, coffee shops, and music venues to the neighborhood.

Mark Kirwan opens Kirwan's Irish Pub with the entire restaurant's handmade décor shipped in (and even constructed by carpenters) from Ireland. (See our full write up later in this issue.)

Award-winning sommelier and artisan cocktail-maker Todd Thrasher brings his latest venture Potomac Distilling, with an in-house rum distillery and two-story tavern.

Whiskey Charlie, The Wharf's first rooftop bar and lounge got its name from

ing the Washington Channel. Sitting atop the Canopy by Hilton, the views promise to be amazing.

The Brighton will be sure to be a hit as it sits along the promenade inviting patrons in for fun and drinks as it opens directly in front of The Anthem.

Mixed in to keep you going will be coffee and ice cream shops, ensuring that the fun does not stop. Velo Café will open inside District Hardware and Bike, offering locally sourced coffee, pastries, sandwiches, and beer.

The capital's first Blue Bottle Coffee will open to high acclaim. The premium coffee shop ensures "all coffee served on the premises is no more than 48 hours out of the roaster."

Ben & Jerry's Ice Cream will compete with district favorites Dolcezza Gelato, offering espresso and gelato in their Argentinean-inspired setting, while District Doughnut will offer round, tasty goodness. Lastly, don't forget to stop by Harper Macaw chocolate-makers for local, premium chocolate, or its next-door neighbor, Momofuku's Milk Bar.

MUSIC

Have you heard of the Foo Fighters? Well, as Dave Grohl, the front man of the United States's biggest rock band said, The Anthem "is set to become the No. 1 venue in America. It has the illusion of a stadium, but the intimacy of a nightclub. It's perfect." The band opens the venue on Oct. 12.

Not to be outdone, the waterfront will have music on both ends of the mile-long strip. Opening up across from each other along Water St. SW are Pearl Street Warehouse and Union Stage. The small-scale music venues will feature music for all types. Union Stage will feature rock concerts, acoustic performances, children's concerts, private events, and community gatherings, while Pearl Street Warehouse will be an intimate music venue featuring live music seven nights a week, including rock, blues, roots, bluegrass, and country.

SHOPS

To balance out all those calories. The Wharf will offer a number of options to take care of your mind and body. Pamper yourself at Bella Moda Salon & Spa, Blush Med Skincare, and L'occitane Spa.

Or take care of your mind at DC favorite Politics and Prose Bookstore's new 2.300-square-foot store (including a special for Southwest residents; see the article in this issue). And for a mix of both, Yoga Factory will offer Bikram hot yoga, BUTI, Vinvasa, HIIT, and restorative voga.

There will also be a number of boutique stores to help you update your home and your closet with the opening of A Beautiful Closet, offering clothing, jewel-



And as much as we recommend keeping The Southwester on hand at all times to ensure you do not get lost, The Wharf has developed a free app you can download from your preferred app store.





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
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Amidon-Bowen Thanks a Community Partner

Kick ids need the opportunity to excel, and it's up to people like us to help give them the opportunity to get their foot through the door," said Bruce DarConte, president and founder of Near Southeast Community Partners (NSCP), an organization whose mission is creating a vibrant riverfront community. Last Chance to Tour DC's Floating Homes Before Wharf Grand Opening

outhwest DC is gearing up for the grand opening of the Wharf, and one community of Southwesters will be dramatically transformed by the new development. On Saturday, Oct. 7, the live-aboard residents of Gangplank Marina will open their doors for the tour of floating homes—the last chance for visitors to experience this community in transition before it's changed forever by the massive Wharf redevelopment, said to be the largest such project currently in the United States.

Gangplank Marina is home to the eastern United States's largest community of "live-aboards"-people and families who make their homes on-board boats and barges. The Gangplank community dates back many decades, however the Southwest waterfront had long been the site of boat homes, as far back as its origins as a working waterfront in the District's early days. Over the vears, the live-aboard community has continually evolved, and been home to all types of Washingtonians. Drawn by the allure of the water, the close-knit community, or the uniquely affordable location, many have called Gangplank home. From the famous (or infamous) residents such as scandalous senators, to the everyday families just making a life on the water, throughout its history the marina has seen all stripes of residents on its docks.


Those docks now show quite a bit of wear and tear, and the Wharf has already begun a much-needed facelift and redesign of Gangplank Marina. The first of the marina's new docks opened last year, giving residents a taste of the "world class" marina in their future. Many are excited for the new facilities on the water, and for the vibrant tableau of restaurants and businesses soon to open on land. Though for some, the excitement is tempered with a touch of bittersweet nostalgia for days gone by.

The Oct. 7 tour is a chance to celebrate the current and past live-aboard life, and to welcome the bright future of the Wharf era. Visitors will have a chance to peek inside about 23 boats and barges, and see the unique and quirky spaces of life afloat. The homes are as singular as the people who live aboard them. Step aboard a 34-foot houseboat that's home to its owner and two dogs. Check out a 55-foot trawler inhabited by a couple and their two small children. See the painstaking restoration work two empty nesters have been doing themselves on a beautiful 60-foot cruiser, including a musical salon that often hosts neighbors for singing and play-along evenings. No two floating homes are the same!



Preliminary Design Released for New Southwest Library

n the summer of 2018, the current Southwest Neighborhood Library will close and an interim library will be erected until the new library is completed in early 2020.

The overall square footage of the new library will be similar in size, however public use space will increase dramatically from 66% to 81%. The current design calls for the new library to be two stories with a solar panel roof and parking on the east side of the building. Some interesting design elements are being considered; a community favorite is a front porch that will overlook the playground on the north side of the building.

The same architect that worked on Arena Stage has been hired for this project and the developers have promised a lot of wood and glass, similar to Arena Stage.
